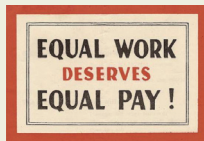

VOTER EDUCATION**



Are you interested in helping the LWV-LA advocate for more active participation in Making Democracy Work? The 2016 elections present both opportunities and challenges for the local League to get more people to the polls and to provide the electorate with information about the candidates and the issues. Volunteers are needed for all of the efforts outlined below.

The Voter Service Committee is developing a series of initiatives designed to increase voter registration in high schools and across the greater Lansing community, including housing complexes and neighborhood centers. We expect to work with city/county/township clerks in our voter advocacy campaigns.

We have also organized into county groups (Ingham, Clinton, Eaton, and Jackson) to facilitate the collection of information for Vote411.org and to ensure a more systematic distribution of printed copies of Voter Guides. These groups will also make recommendations for candidate forums and assist in their organization.

The committee is actively engaged in increasing public awareness about the importance of voting and the issues emerging in these elections through more targeted and effective media coverage-and we're looking for ideas and help.
